

For this issue, our intrepid reporter spoke with Claire Goose, British drama superstar – you may recognise her from Casualty, Waking the Dead or The Coroner!

Why did you become an actor?

The first time I realised that acting could be a job, was when I watched Helen Mirren in Prime Suspect. I was blown away by her and her character. It was like nothing I had watched before. After seeing that I asked my mum and dad if I could go to acting classes. They found a drama group in King's Lynn that was run by Jenny Duda (still a very close friend of mine.) She was so inspiring and creative. She made me feel confident in my ability and I always remember how much laughter there was. Endless laughter!

What do you like best about Norfolk?

Oh wow, where do I start? I've definitely come to appreciate it more since having children. It has so much to offer for families. But for me, it's the big Norfolk Skies and the coast. Living in London, everywhere is so built up and every time we come home to Norfolk and hit the fens, the skies just open up. I can feel all the tension just melt away. We always head to the beach come rain or shine. Holkham, Blakeney, Wells, Brancaster, Snettisham - it's all gorgeous!

Can you share your most memorable moment as an actor?

I felt very lucky to work on Exile with John Simm, Jim Broadbent and Olivia Colman (another Norfolk girl!) It was a beautifully written script by Daniel Brocklehurst and created by Paul Abbott. Absolute legends. It was a really fun job despite the subject matter being harsh and I just learn so much from working with them all.

If you could go back in time, where would you go to?

I'm not sure I would want to go back. Women's lives were hugely restricted and hard! I feel very blessed to be where I am and hope we continue to progress forward in equality for all.

Borough Council Matters

Autumn is upon us, and your Borough Council (West Norfolk and King's Lynn) has plenty of work to do. The most important is creating the budget for the next financial year starting April 2022. It's a big task in any year but in the current uncertain times there will be a lot of questions with no obvious answers.

All Committees and the Full Council are back to face-to face meetings for councillors and the main support staff. We have retained real-time streaming of these meetings, so everyone can watch meetings in real-time or look back on them the Borough Council's you tube channel. The Council has at last declared a climate emergency.

I am part of the group of independent councillors (the largest opposition group to the Conservative majority) and we have been advocating for this for over two years. I am very pleased that the pressure the Independent Group applied has now born fruit. The Council also has a Climate Change/Environmental Policy in place and is in the last stages of producing a strategy to push these very important long-term issues forward in a more cohesive way.

The Council has recently agreed that all councillors will be given access to £1000 annually to fund grants to community groups within their wards. So, I will soon have access to £1000 for grants for community groups in the Denver Ward (which does not include the Ten Mile Bank ward of Hilgay Parish).

There are several conditions, and I can provide a copy of the overall policy document to any group who are interested in making an application. That document sets out, in broad terms, how the scheme should work and who or what might qualify. There has not been a formal announcement yet because the full details of how the scheme will work are still being tied down. But I expect this to be finalised soon and appear on the council website with guidance and the application form. Until then I am happy to talk to any group who might want to think about applying.

Anglian Water (AW) have submitted a planning application (21/0158/FM) to lay a new water main between the Bexwell reservoir and Bury St Edmunds. It's part of a very large scheme to provide East Anglia with better access to fresh water. The AW website has full details as does the BC's planning portal on our website.

I understand that the application is to be decided elsewhere because the project covers several jurisdictions. The BC's involvement is to consult Parish Councils and the wider community and pass those comments on the decision-making body. It will be underground and pass along the Eastern edge of Hilgay Ward. Personally, I am very much in favour to this as it will help to safe guard our fresh water supplies in the future.

Next stop Christmas.

Hilgay comes together for the rededication of war memorial



On Saturday 11th September 2021, residents of Hilgay came together at the rededication of the war memorial to remember those lost at war.

Parish Council Chairman, Graham Carter, opened the ceremony. In attendance, was Father James Mather whom lead the prayers at the ceremony; as well as representatives from the Royal British Legion, USAF Lakenheath, RAF Marham and Norfolk Constabulary.

Hilgay war memorial holds 46 names of men from the village that were lost during the first and second world war, as well as six of the eight names of the crew members of an American B17 bomber that crashed near to Hilgay in 1945; in which the president from the Royal British Legion read out.

Representatives then laid wreathes in respect of the men lost at war.

Towards the end of the ceremony, students from Hilgay Riverside Academy sang some songs which brought a wonderful atmosphere to the ceremony.

After the service came to an end, many ceremony attendees visited Hilgay All Saints Church to enjoy a variation of tunes played by Hilgay Silver Band, and to enjoy refreshments provided by the church.

All Saints Church also displayed various memorabilia from the war and Hilgay Riverside Academy created art work and written pieces that were also displayed in the church.

Title: Gone, But Not Forgotten

Gone, But Not Forgotten

On March 30, 1945 an American B-17 crashed near Poplar Farm in Hilgay, killing six American Airmen and wounding another two. This was the fourth, and thankfully final, aircraft crash in the Parish of Hilgay during World War II, and today the victims of these four crashes – including these six Americans – are recorded on the newly renovated Hilgay War Memorial. They died while fighting to liberate Europe from the fascist Nazi regime, so they clearly earned a place of honor on our war memorials. But otherwise who were these Americans, and what were they doing in the air above Hilgay that morning, over 76 years ago?

First, and most importantly, these were young men with their whole lives ahead of them. The oldest crew member was 26, and the youngest was just 20. The first listed on the Hilgay War Memorial is 2lt Willis C. DuMond from New York, who, at 25 years old, was the pilot that morning – the aircraft commander. As Captain of the ship, Willis was responsible for both flying the B-17 and also for the welfare of the crew. Although an experienced military officer, he had only begun aviation duty in June 1944 – just 10 months before the crash. He left behind a wife, Betty, and son, Chester.

The other married man in the crew, listed last on the memorial, was Sergeant Daniel Cursons, who was also from New York. At 26 years old, Daniel was the "old man" on the team, and he served as the Flight Engineer and Top Turret Gunner. Daniel's only child, Daniel Jr., was born to his wife Ann after he deployed to combat, depriving his namesake of ever meeting his father in person.

The rest of the crew was unmarried, but they undoubtably had only postponed their personal lives because of the war. Flight Officer Carl C. Jones was the Co-Pilot from Texas. At 20 years old he was the youngest member of the flight crew, and as it turns out he was also the youngest of eight siblings in the Jones household. Carl's only brother, William, was also a pilot in the US Army Air Forces, but he too was tragically killed in action in the Pacific theater in May 1944. Dying only 10 months apart, the Jones family paid an exceptionally high price for the war, and in the end they were left without any male heirs.

20-year-old Sergeant Carl Hartman from Oklahoma was the radio operator, and 24-year-old Sergeant Roy Frost from Kansas was the Ball Turret Gunner. 2lt Ernest Matthews from Connecticut was the Bombardier, and today, he is the only crewmember still buried at Cambridge American Cemetery, as the others were all repatriated to the US after the war, at the request of their families.

These young men were members of what Americans call the "Greatest Generation." This term, coined by one of our most respected and patriotic journalists, Tom Brokaw, describes the generation that fought World War II and lived through what was perhaps the toughest period in American history – the Great Depression. The global economic slump that struck in 1929 had an exaggerated effect on American society because of our fragile, and still industrializing, economy. The men of this crew were all born in the 1920s, and since none of them came from families of great means they unquestionably suffered from the extreme privations of the depression. None of them attended university or had professional jobs before the war. Whether they volunteered or were conscripted, it is likely that military service was for them – as it was for so many other Americans of the Greatest Generation – a salvation from poverty and desperation.

Each of them volunteered for aviation service and attended technical training in the US in autumn 1944. The US military sent them to England as "replacements" and assigned them to the 452nd Bomb Group located at RAF Deopham Green. It was only at this point that the individuals met each other for the first time, and they needed to quickly forge a bond so that they could work together and rely on each other as an efficient fighting team.

The mission on 30 March 1945 was to strike the port facility in Hamburg, Germany. This might seem like an odd target so late in the war, but U-boats of the Nazi Navy (the *Kreigsmarine*) were still inflicting serious losses on Allied shipping in the North Atlantic, North Sea, and English Channel. In total, 1,250 aircraft took off that morning for the daylight attack, but they had little to fear from the Nazi Air Force (the *Luftwaffe*) because Allied Air Forces had established air superiority over Western Europe a year earlier. For this reason, DuMond's B-17 flew without Waist Gunners; reducing the crew to 8, instead of the normal 10.

The greater risk came from the other aircraft flying in tight formation. When the formation was large, as it was on 30 March, it could take up to two hours to get everyone in position, and mid-air collisions were a real possibility. On that fateful morning, DuMond maneuvered his B-17 through the hundreds of other aircraft to find his place, and while over Hilgay Parish he narrowly missed a collision with another Flying Fortress. Unfortunately, flying through the propwash of the other aircraft caused DuMond to lose control of his B-17, resulting in the catastrophic crash that took his life, along with the lives of 5 others on board. All six were buried in the temporary American Military Cemetery at Madingley.

Amazingly, two crew members – not yet mentioned, and not listed on the Hilgay War Memorial – lived through the ordeal. 2lt Dan O'Conner (Navigator) and Sergeant John Stewart (Tail Gunner) recovered from their physical wounds at Ely Air Force Hospital, but their mental wounds, like those of the Greatest Generation, never fully healed. O'Conner and Stewart returned to duty with the 452nd Bomb Group in time to join their comrades for the trip home. Their war was over.

Despite the loss of DuMond's B-17, the mission on 30 March, like the strategic bombing campaign itself, was a tremendous success! In addition to demolishing port logistics and facilities, the bombers sank seven U-boats, which unquestioningly saved the lives of many Allied sailors and merchant marines. With this final victory in hand, the role of the US Army Air Forces in Europe was quickly coming to an end. 452nd Bomb Group only flew in combat 17 more times before their last mission on 21 April 1945. After VE Day the unit quickly packed up and returned to the US.

| For those listed on the Hilgay War Memorial, however, repatriation would have to wait until 1949, and closure for their families would never come at all. These young men, who represent thousands of others just like them, would never enjoy the very freedom that they helped win for us. We must never forget them. |



A gift from Delia

Our intrepid reporter (Norman) has been trying hard over the last few months to get an interview with the wonderful Delia Smith for our Getting to know... series.

However, now Norwich City FC are back in the Premier League, Delia is far too busy!

She has, instead, gifted us a special recipe now the evenings draw nearer and the cold of winter is upon us. We hope you enjoy it!

SHEPHERD'S PIE WITH CHEESE-CRUSTED LEEKS

This recipe can be made with either fresh minced lamb (shepherd's pie), fresh minced beef (cottage pie) or minced leftover beef or lamb from a cooked joint (in which case, cut the initial cooking time to 15 minutes).

INGREDIENTS

| 1 lb (450 g) minced lamb | 10 fl oz (275 ml) fresh lamb stock |
|--|--------------------------------------|
| 1 level tablespoon tomato purée | salt and freshly milled black pepper |
| 1 tablespoon olive oil | 2 medium onions, peeled and chopped |
| 3 oz (75 g) carrot, peeled and chopped | 1 teaspoon chopped fresh thyme |
| 3 oz (75 g) swede, peeled and chopped | ½ level teaspoon ground cinnamon |
| 1 tablespoon chopped fresh parsley | 1 level tablespoon plain flour |

For the topping:

- 2 oz (50 g) mature Cheddar, coarsely grated
- 2 medium leeks, cleaned and cut into ½ inch (1 cm) slices
- 2 lb (900 g) Desirée or King Edward potatoes
- salt and freshly milled black pepper

METHOD

Begin by taking the frying pan or saucepan and, over a medium flame, gently heat the olive oil.

Now fry the onions in the hot oil until they are tinged brown at the edges – about 5 minutes. You can also watch how to peel and chop onions in our Cookery School Video on the right. Add the chopped carrot and swede and cook for 5 minutes or so, then remove the vegetables and put them to one side. Now turn the heat up and brown the meat in batches, tossing it around to get it all nicely browned. You may find a wooden fork helpful here, as it helps to break up the mince. After that, give the meat a good seasoning of salt and pepper, then add the cooked vegetables, cinnamon, thyme and parsley.

Next, stir in the flour, which will soak up the juice, then gradually add the stock to the meat mixture until it is all incorporated. Finally, stir in the tomato purée. Now turn the heat right down, put the lid on the pan and let it cook gently for about 30 minutes.

While the meat is cooking you can make the topping. Peel the potatoes, cut them into even-sized pieces and place in a steamer fitted over a large pan of boiling water, sprinkle with some salt, put a lid on and steam until they're completely tender – about 25 minutes. While this is happening, pre-heat the oven to gas mark 6, 400°F (200°C).

When the potatoes are done, drain off the water, return them to the saucepan, cover with a clean tea cloth to absorb the steam and leave them for about 5 minutes. Next, add the butter and mash them to a purée – the best way to do this is with an electric hand whisk. Don't be tempted to add any milk here, because the mashed potato on top of the pie needs to be firm.

Taste and add more salt and pepper if necessary. When the meat is ready, spoon it into the baking dish and level it out with the back of the spoon. After that, spread the mashed potato evenly all over. Now sprinkle the leeks on top of the potato, scatter the cheese over the leeks and bake the whole thing on a high shelf of the oven for about 25 minutes, or until the top is crusty and golden.
